She has two daughters and three cats!




BATTLE OF THE BRAINS ROUND 3

July 14 marked the third Battle of the Brains, a series of quiz nights set up by Malta University Holding Company in collaboration with the University of Malta Research, Innovation and Development Trust, to help raise funds for research in ALS.

Since its first edition last year, the quiz night has built quite a reputation for itself attracting a wide range of people, from families and friends looking for a night out with a bit of a difference, to groups of employees eyeing the event as an ideal team builder.

For the first time ever, this year's event was held at Saracino's Restaurant in Attard and doubled as a pizza night. It also marked MUHC's biggest quiz night yet with a record number of participants joining to help support research in ALS.

Bridging the Skills Gap in the STEM Sector

Half Day Conference





On 12th September 2017, Malta University Consulting (MUC) and Malta Business Bureau (MBB), being the local partners in the Go&Learn+ Project, organised a half-day conference to promote the achievements of this project and provide a medium for a thorough discussion on 'Bridging the Skills Gap in the STEM Sector' to take place. The event was held at the Malta Chamber of Commerce, Enterprise and Industry in Valletta. The conference was attended by a number of high-profile experts, industry professionals and entrepreneurs who contributed to the two panel discussions.

Mr. Frank V. Farrugia, the Malta Chamber President delivered his welcome speech commending the collaboration between MBB and MUC to promote employability in the STEM sector. Reference was also made to the importance of innovation for local companies to remain relevant and competitive, the importance of industry to keep up with developments in technology and therefore the need for Malta's education system to develop people with STEM skills set.

MBB CEO Mr. Joe Tanti, Dr Ing. Alexia Pace Kiomall, MUC Manager and Ms. Marija Elena Borg, MBB Executive explained the local contribution to the Go&Learn+ Project where the focus was mainly on start-ups and University students. This included bringing together University of Malta students and a number of local start-ups in three study visits. Moreover, two sector specific circuits each offering six industry visits were set up (ICT for Business, Leisure & Commodity and Diversification in Gastronomy) to facilitate student visits and B2B cooperation on the international level. Two panel discussions were held with the participation of the Rector of the University of Malta, MCAST Vice-Principal, Education Ministry Consultant, Chairperson of the Malta Chamber HR Committee, Chairperson National Skills Council, Malta Life Sciences Park Director, TAKEOFF Business Incubator Manager, one of the co-founders of Altaro Software and Founder of ELTY Food.

Discussions focused on the skills gap in the STEM sector being faced in Europe and in Malta in particular, resulting from near full employment and the lack of the proper exposure of the innovative and creative aspects of STEM subjects to excite students at the primary and secondary levels of education. The latter should translate into more students furthering their careers in STEM subjects at MCAST and at the University. The Esplora Interactive Science Centre especially if considered as an extension of the classroom is a good example of how to achieve this aim. Having adequately equipped labs will also contribute towards the solution. Parents need to be convinced of the importance for students to take up science subjects though the poor performance in examinations in these subjects is not helping. Choice of subjects at an early age is also hindering students from taking STEM subjects.

Furthermore, the local education system needs to prepare more people to take up high-end jobs. Industry and the education system need to collaborate and have the drive and discipline to do what it takes to keep up with technology. Teachers need to continuously be made aware of technological developments and understand what is happening in the industry as together with parents they are the main influencers of students. The Rector added that this October the University will be introducing a new bachelor's degree in Science and Education. This course should train students in better communicating science subjects. Employers should nurture the culture of inquiring on the place of work. Personal development at the workplace helps to reduce the shortage of STEM expertise and increase job incentive. Industry should invest more in people by employing less qualified people and provide on the job training. Story telling of success stories should be encouraged. Companies need to invest more in knowledge transfer as an incentive to staff. Closer collaboration is required between University and industry. One way of achieving this collaboration is through internships and work-based learning. Entrepreneurs can be made if training is given in the required skills.

In his closing address, MBB President Dr. David Zahra stated that by 2025, the demand for STEM professionals is expected to grow by around 8%. Meeting this increase in demand requires all main stakeholders in particular government, educators, employers and students to give priority to this sector. The formation of strategic partnerships between all stakeholders is one way of achieving this.


